As a child growing up in Grayton Beach in the 80s, Jennifer Steele never dreamed she'd one day become the director of a non-profit that would help cultivate the arts in our region. She just knew she loved visiting the little art shop of local Grayton Beach artist Susan Foster where she would buy postcards and photos. Susan's gallery was her first experience with fine art and as much a part of young Jennifer's childhood memories as Grayton Beach itself.

Susan, along with another local Jan Clarke, dreamed of having an art festival with other local artists to help bring the community together to provide a sense of community the art world provides. Susan and Jan began mentioning their arts festival idea to other locals such as Van Ness Butler, and the buzz began with folks coming into the gallery talking excitedly. The Walton County Tourist Development Council, who also adminis-

tered the festival's first TDC grant, recommended they schedule the event during a slower time of year.

The rest is history. In 1989, with a small community gathering, the first Grayton Beach Fine Arts Festival, now called ArtsQuest, was born! Early organizers chose Mother's Day weekend with the event becoming one of the first in our area to promote a "shoulder season."

Many locals, all volunteers and names you might still recognize today, were involved in this first endeavor including Jeff Ellis, Chris and Manny Chavez, Malcolm Patterson, Paul Digiamico, Doug Krumel, Nicky Frye, Jack Houston, Hilda McDonald, Kitty Tyler and several more. Through the years, it evolved into a weekend event and has moved to various locations such as Eden State Gardens, Seaside and The Village of Baytowne Wharf to accom-

PCB Council Toughens Rules Following Unrest

In the aftermath of unprecedented civil disorder by hundreds of out-of-state troublemakers during the last weekend in March, Police Chief J.R. Talamantez raised the primal issue confronting Panama City Beach:

"We have to figure out what kind of a city we want to be," he told City Council during an emergency meeting on April 1.

Sparked by an out-of-state social media campaign calling for a "Panamaniac" takeover of the city's streets, thousands of out-of-state men, including known street gang members, swarmed the Beach on Saturday and early Sunday, March 26-27. The crowds shut down streets, and engaged in mass looting and other criminal acts that area business leaders said terrorized residents and early family visitors to the city.

Forewarned of the event by social media posts, City Manager Drew Whitman and Chief Tala-

mantez prepared the best way they could, by contacting other local and state law enforcement agencies for reinforcements.



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More than 130 law enforcement officers were on the streets nearly twice the city police department's entire 77-member roster – when the unruly crowds began their rampage.

'These weren't college-age people coming down here to have a good time," a furious Mayor Mark Sheldon told the packed City Council chamber. "These are people who came here to be lawless and nothing more. They came here to wreak havoc, and that's what they did."

When the night of mayhem had ended, police had arrested 161 people on a total of 120 charges, including 60 on gun charges and 70 for illegal drugs. Police reports showed that half of those arrested had come down from Alabama, where the unsanctioned "Panamaniac" gathering had been heavily promoted. Police seized 75 illegal weapons, including a number of AR-15 assault rifles.

Sheldon and Council members - along with dozens of residents at the April 1 meeting - showered praise on law enforcement members who braved the chaos to reassert control and arrest wrongdoers.

One weapon that proved vi-

tal to their effort was the Bay County Real Time Operations Center, a collaborative effort between the Bay County Sheriff's Office, other local police departments and participating businesses. The network provides relevant video and other information directly to law enforcement on the streets. Operating since last November, a primary element of BAYROC is a network of traffic, school and participating business video cameras to assist law enforcement officers responding to a crime.

Even so, Beach officials realized that more is needed to prevent future mob invasions. Sheldon and Council members have taken swift action to bolster the city's defenses. During the emergency meeting, Council held the first reading of an emergency response ordinance that Sheldon said will provide the city with the ability not only to respond more rapidly to such an emergency, but to take pre-emptive action in the face of an impending threat.

Drafted in the days following the unrest, Ordinance 1586 authorizes the city manager to declare a state of emergency in



lieu of requiring an emergency City Council meeting to formally vote on such a measure. "We wanted to give the city manager quicker authority," Sheldon explained. "It can take up to six hours (for the council) to call an emergency meeting. ... (With) this, we'll go from six hours to six minutes."

The emergency powers authorized in the ordinance include:

• The establishment of curfews in all or part of the city;

• The prohibition of the sale, distribution, or service of any alcoholic beverage;

• The prohibition of the possession or consumption of alcoholic beverages other than on a person's own premises;

• The closing of any area of public or private gatherings;

• The prohibition of the rent-

al or operation of any low-speed vehicle, golf cart, or other vehicles found to be "incompatible" with normal and safe traffic flow

• The termination of utility services at any real property address:

• The suspension, revocation, or denial of any previously granted special event permit;

• Authorization for city personnel to enter private property and provide "emergency nuisance abatement" if needed, and for city personnel to provide emergency assistance to private property or businesses critically affected by the declared emergency:

• The authorization to close any public beach access or portion of the sandy beach.

In addition, the new ordinance will grant the city manager the power to enact "advanced preventative measures" if it is determined that "a reasonable

likelihood" exists that a civil

emergency will occur in the city within the next 12 hours. This includes the ban on low-speed vehicles, canceling special event permits, use of city property to detain or impound persons or property, and beach closures.

Sheldon told the meeting that the ordinance balances the

need for action in a civil emergency against the constitutional rights of people, including visitors. A declared state of emergency will automatically expire after a maximum of 72 hours and a formal City Council vote is required to extend beyond that period.

Whitman told PCB Life that the measure will give the city "the ability to quickly and effectively reduce dangers and disburse dangerous crowds as well as congestion in areas where we see a high amount of vehicle and pedestrian traffic."

"The hope is that it will alle-

viate any type of mob mentality from the very beginning," Whitman added.

Passed unanimously at the first reading, Ordinance 1586 was scheduled to undergo a second reading and final vote by City Council at its April 14 meeting.

Spring is Much Welcome After a Cold Winter

Spring is the season of rebirth and we are certainly seeing that on Panama City Beach. After coming out of what seemed like a really cold winter, warmer temperatures are here and have brought locals and day-trippers out. Families from across the U.S. have taken advantage of having a few days off to enjoy the World's Most Beautiful Beaches during Spring Break!

Spring is truly the hard start of our beach season. According to Visit Panama City Beach data, 31 percent of all visitors last year came in the spring. Summer is obviously the peak season, accounting for 40 percent of our annual visitors.

Last year was a record-breaker for tourism in Panama City Beach. We had more visitors than ever before. A record number of people flew into the Northwest Florida Beaches International Airport. Hotels, condos, and short-term rentals stayed full.

All of this is reflected in the City's number one source of income for the General Fund Budget, Business Tax Receipts (BTR). BTR fees are \$1 per \$100 in gross sales.

Every local resident who buys milk and cereal for their family, every commuter who shops for clothing during their lunch break, every visitor who pays for lodging and meals out, is contributing to the operations of this City. You are all stakeholders, as your dollars pay for new firetrucks, lifeguards, body cameras for police officers, parks and recreation staff who maintain our fields and special programs, road resurfacing, certain street lighting, and so much more.

As the largest city in the state without an ad valorem (proper-



ty) tax, the BTRs are important to us. Tourism, as our largest industry, is important to this community. Our "season" keeps our businesses in business.

Of course, we cannot predict the future, but all indicators are, we are in store for another great year. The pandemic is waning somewhat, and surveys show that people have resolved to live their lives, to travel, while taking the necessary precautions. Conventions and reunions are coming back, and hotels are already seeing activity in this area. We continue to offer a variety of special events, festivals, and tournaments that attract thousands to our community each vear.

There is a concern about the effects of the rising price of gasoline, and if it will inhibit travel. We do not think it will have a substantial effect here, especially because many of our visitors come from the Southeast - a day's drive or less away. While young families on limited budgets may be more impacted, a consultant recently shared that retirees will not wait for the price of gas to come down. They are not postponing the travel adventures they have waited a lifetime to take. While the trip might be more expensive, the additional cost, many feel, is worth it.

People may travel closer to home this year, according to Longwoods International, a destination and travel research firm. A recent survey by the firm found that travelers were more keen on reducing the expenses of the trip when it comes to meals, accommodations, and souvenirs.

One year ago, Longwoods' travel survey found that 87 percent would travel over the next six months. In March 2022, 92 percent said they plan on traveling within the next six months. The top three activities on their next trip: visit family and friends (47 percent), take a road trip (42 percent), and go to the beach/ waterfront (41 percent.)

Our community is blessed with the appealing features travelers want - a beautiful environment, natural resources, and great weather. Travelers want to revel in the great outdoors and sometimes, their number one goal is relaxation. What better place to chill than the beach!



Second Annual Hats & Horses: A Kentucky Derby-Style Benefit for Club 360 May 7



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Let's Get Growing with Julie: Hiring a Landscape Professional

In my role as horticulture agent, I get a lot of requests for recommendations for landscape installation, maintenance, and pest control. To remain objective and avoid any conflict of interest, I cannot provide referrals. However, I can educate callers on how to be informed consumers by sharing Florida Friendly LandscapingTM Principles and explaining certifications to verify when hiring a company.

Unlike many other skilled trades, landscape and grounds

maintenance is mostly unregulated by the State of Florida, except for commercial (for-hire) pesticide and fertilizer applications. Any person applying fertilizer or pesticide in a landscape setting for hire must hold the appropriate certifications required by Florida Statute Chapter 482 and Administrative Rules 5E-14, which are enforced by Florida Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services (FDACS).

Let's start out by defining fertilizers and pesticides. A fertilizer is any substance that contains at least one recognized plant nutrient which promotes plant growth, affects soil acidity/alkalinity, or enriches the soil. This includes synthetic or organic fertilizers, lime, or sulfur applications. A pesticide is any substance that repels, kills, or inhibits the growth of a pest (weed, pathogen, arthropod, animal) which includes herbicides, insecticides, miticides, fungicides, rodenticides, disinfectants, etc. Combination products such as "weed-n-feed" are both a fertil-



izer and a pesticide and require both certifications when applied by a green industry professional.

How do you know if the person you want to hire is certified? FDACS maintains a public database online that anyone can access here https://aessearch. fdacs.gov/ Each individual applying pesticides or fertilizers in a landscape must be certified, but there are many types of certifications in Florida so below is a quick reference guide for certifications relevant to home and business landscapes:

Fertilizer applications to landscape plants (lawn, ornamentals, flowers, trees) at a home or businesses not owned by the applicator require the Limited Urban Commercial Fertilizer certification. The license number for this certificate starts with "LF". Each person making applications must have their own certificate, there is no "working under" someone else's license allowed.

Pesticide applications to lawns (excludes sports turf) and/ or ornamental beds requires an ID Card/Pest Control license. This license number will start with "JE".

Pesticide applications to ornamental beds only (lawns applications not permitted with this certification) must hold the Limited Commercial Landscape Maintenance certification. This number will start with "LC".

Whether or not your landscape maintenance will require chemical applications it is a good idea to also verify the company has Workers' Compensation https://dwcdataportal.fldfs. com/ProofOfCoverage.aspx and liability insurance (request proof of insurance).

Other certifications that are not required but indicate voluntary advanced training by the individual include: • Florida-Friendly LandscapingTM Certified Professional (FFLCP) https://ffl.ifas.ufl.edu/ ffl-and-you/ffl-professional-certification/fflcp-list/

• Florida Nursery, Growers and Landscape Association (FNGLA) certifications https:// profile.fngla.org/verify-a-certification

• Certified Horticulture Professional (FCHP)

• Certified Landscape Contractor (FCLD)

Gift to PCB Senior Center Has Strings Attached



No doubt you're familiar with the 1992 rock song "Uke of Earl" by Gene Chandler. And these days we read about the impending World War III battle between two ukelear powers. So yes, the ukulele has played a significant role in our nation's history.

While there's no reason to stop the presses, it's nice to hear that the Panama City Beach Senior Center has received a donation. There were strings attached, but no one was complaining since the only tune you can play on the ukulele without strings is "Sounds of Silence."

Yes, the senior center now owns six sparkling new ukes, complete with carrying cases and tuners, thanks to the generosity of the Ukulele Orchestra of St. Andrews.

I have a personal interest in this gift as a senior center mem-

ber (and now on the board) who took uke classes there last year. I did so by checking out an instrument from the city's public library down the block. I was encouraged enough by the instructor—"Peter, that was a good note a minute ago"—that I purchased a uke and practiced religiously. (That doesn't mean I just played religious music.)

In fact, within a week I could play "This Land Is Your Land." And a week later, I nailed "This Land Is My Land." Moving along line by line, I hope to reach "From the Redwood Forest to the Gulf Stream Waters" before widening is complete on Front Beach Road.

As you know, the ukulele dates to the 1880s, introduced in the Hawaiian Islands by Portuguese immigrants. While sales of the instrument have risen and fallen over the years, it became really popular in the 1950s thanks to Arthur Godfrey and later Tiny Tim, whose rendition of "Tiptoe Through the Tulips" inspired Jimi Hendrix to take up the ukulele. (He couldn't find one, the story goes, so he bought a guitar.)

But back to the donation. When I took lessons last year, I practically had the instructor to myself. At a Friday class last month, more than two dozen students filled the activities room at the senior center. It was the first lesson for about half of them. And following the class, they were joined by another 18 members who were more experienced and sounded great playing together. Many had started by borrowing an instrument from the library. Now the center has six to share with members.

"It is wonderful to get a donation like this," the center's volunteer president, Mugsy Parens, said. "Otherwise, a lot of our seniors would not be able to purchase a ukulele to find out if they really wanted to learn to play. This way they have a chance to experience playing and learning. We have had a great response to our program and hope that we can continue to expand our programs with donations like this one."

Jody Wood-Putnam teaches the class and is the gig manager for the Ukulele Orchestra, which performs throughout the Panhandle to raise money to support music education and, she said, "have fun." As part of a current grant campaign, the orchestra is donating instruments to non-profits, including senior centers.

Before the donation, she explained, her class had one ukulele for folks without an instrument who wanted to play. "If we had more than one person show up, we had to tell them to go to the library and check one out and come back later. Unfortunately, the library's ukuleles sometimes were all checked out also, so folks sometimes couldn't even do that. Now folks can try out playing a ukulele without having to commit to buying one."

The class, she said, "gives me such joy to see everyone enjoying themselves and the camaraderie that has developed within the class. I feel so fortunate to be part of such a wonderful group as they gain confidence in their playing, and some of them have become quite good!"

I don't think she was referring to me, but that's OK. I won't fret about it.

modate its growth.

In the meantime, Jennifer was

growing up and witnessing it all happen in her hometown. Today, 34 years since the festival's inception, Jennifer is the Cultural Arts Alliance (CAA) Executive Director and ArtsQuest is one of the largest juried art shows in the region bringing in thousands of attendees from all over. Having evolved into much more than a community gathering, in a VIE Magazine article, Jennifer describes ArtsQuest as "an intricate and beautifully detailed tapestry, woven over the years by locals tooled with varying backgrounds, resources and talents."

Eventually, realizing the need for a non-profit organization to help cultivate the arts in Walton County, the CAA was formed as the official local arts agency. Its vision is to continue to make Walton County a home and destination for cultural and artistic excellence where lives are enriched, the economy is stimulated and the community is strengthened through the arts. It offers support, connection and access opportunities for all forms of art, every variety of maker, all levels of learners, and especially, art lovers all throughout the year.

Through sponsorships, advocacy, funding and educational programs, the CAA directly connects people to all things art related. ArtsQuest was the first event the CAA ever produced and has truly become a beloved CAA signature event — one of the most significant ways CAA is able to continue to fulfill its mission. It bridges the gap for those who either lack access to the arts or could uniquely benefit from the experience.

Each year, the CAA produces popular, large-scale events, including the 30A Songwriters Festival, Valentine Tour of Homes, ArtsQuest Fine Arts Festival and the Flutterby Children's Arts Festival; operates The Foster Gallery, a local artist collective showcasing art works from more than 30 local artists in a quarterly rotation; and also presents over 250 exciting and educational art workshops in its offices at the Bayou Arts Center. Further, the CAA recently partnered with the South Walton Artificial Reef Association

to launch the nation's first permanent Underwater Museum of Art off the coast of Grayton Beach State Park. Still a Mother's Day weekend tradition, this year's ArtsQuest, May 7 and 8, is being hosted by Grand Boulevard at Sandestin and features exhibiting national, regional and local artists as well as art workshops and live art demonstrations. With continuing support from Visit South Walton and additional support from the Florida Department of State, Division of Arts & Culture and Emerald Coast Magazine, the festival will provide an opportunity to view and purchase original art from more than 100 artists who convene each year from throughout the U.S. They will display their original artwork in various mediums including, but not limited to, ceramics, glass, oil and acrylics, photography, sculpture, metal and wood. They will also compete for awards and cash prizes totaling \$10,000. Further, the festival will offer heritage art demonstrations, a CAA member artist exhibit, a Walton County student exhibit, continuous live music and entertainment and "ImagiNation: where kids rule." A full cash bar will be available throughout the weekend in Grand Park.

You will find this year's featured artist, Orestes Barrios Marañón, who was also the 2021 ArtsQuest 'Best in Show' winner, at the event. His featured piece, "Fable In Eden," is a parody of fables and everyday life, creating stories with each of the characters that live in it. His wide range of work will be on display and "Fable In Eden" is the featured image on all ArtsQuest marketing materials.

An independent engraver, painter, cartoonist, sculptor, designer, set designer and children's book illustrator, Orestes was born in Cuba in 1963, studied at the Provincial School of Arts of Pinar del Rio specializing in plastic arts and graduated from the National School of Arts "Cubanacan" in Havana in 1983. Orestes has received more than 20 national and international awards for his artistic work as well as various recognitions for his teaching. He has had eight personal art exhibitions and participated in more than 70 collective exhibitions in Cuba, Canada, Germany, Argentina, Spain, France, Uruguay and the U.S.

training, and experience. Beach Mosquito Control District uses an extensive surveillance system to locate and identify the many mosquito species in our district. By knowing where the mosquitoes breed, we can treat the water and prevent the larva from emerging as flying adult mosquitoes. This surveillance also triggers our control measures, both larviciding and adulticiding. We also identify and track any mosquito virus transmission via our extensive arbovirus surveillance system and our mosquito pooling system. We collect mosquitoes and speciate them and send them to the State of Florida, Department of Health Lab in Tampa, for evaluation. If there is any arbovirus present, the Lab notifies us, and we ramp up control measures. We are mostly concerned with EEE (Eastern Equine Encephalitis) and WNV (West Nile Virus).

Lastly, as mentioned, we are

a tax-based organization. We encourage the residents and visitors to our beautiful area to call us at (850) 233-5030 or go to our website and put in a service request, free of charge, if they are being bothered by mosquitoes. www.pcbeachmosquito.org

ISO: PCB's Best Frozen Drink

The daiquiri's origin goes back to an actual cocktail recipe card signed by a "Jennings Cox" in 1896. This original recipe underwent an important transformation in the 1920s and 1930s when, with shaved ice and an electric blender, Constantino "Constante" Ribalaigua Vert, bartender and owner of a little bar called Floridita in Havana, Cuba, perfected the drink. The frozen daiquiri was born. Ernest Hemingway happened into the bar soon after and sampled the frozen creation, then requested it without sugar and with double the rum due to his diabetes. The cocktail became conducive to epic drinking sessions and Hemingway became a regular. In one account, Hemingway put away 15 frozen daiquiris in one sitting. The "Hemingway Special" has a permanent spot on the menu.

Frozen Mason Jar Daiquiris: While researching this month's "Best Frozen Drink" section, I came across an article from *The Yummy Life* that showed a recipe, an easy one, for flavored frozen daiquiris. Each daiquiri contains frozen fruit (I guess you can say that's the healthy part), and they taste great. The best part is that you can mix several ahead of time and pour them into 16 oz. mason jars (now available at Michael's in Pier Park) and freeze them until needed. Here's a helpful hint: leave some room at the top of the jar as they expand while they freeze! The alcohol keeps them from freezing completely, so just remove them from the freezer about 10 minutes before serving.


The staple on their menu is

Bay Arts Alliance is excited to announce the installation of a new permanent piece, Transformation. After years of planning, Bay Arts Alliance unveiled this piece created by local glass artist Dr. Marlene East on April 1. Measuring 14' long and spanning two floors, Transformation has 240 pieces of art glass suspended from a polished steel ring fabricated by local metal artist, Stephen Harman. Funds for this piece were given in memory of Mary Dennise Dodd (1933-2020) - Loving Christian, Wife, Mother, Grandmother, Artist, and Friend.

Transformation symbolizes the energetic revitalization of downtown Panama City, the metamorphosis from caterpillar to butterfly, as well as transformations in color that occur in the kiln-firing process.


Does this Look Like the Face of a Feral Cat?

30Acats daily feeds over 150 homeless cats every day in dozens of locations. Weekly they also humanely TRAP - NEU-TER at Bay county's own lowcost vet services SpayBay - and RETURN (TNR). The volunteers who feed the colonies spend time at each feeding, watching for any medical issues or checking to see if there are any new cats that have not been TNR. (Each cat receives a non-harmful tip of the ear as a universal sign of being no longer breeding) While 30Cats usually only socializes kittens between 7 - 10 weeks old, sometimes a homeless



cat because of its personality and the volunteer's dedication will become socialized while in the colony. 30Acats will then transition it to a foster home. The foster patiently helps the cat learn that shelter is nice and NOT scary, makes sure the cat uses the litter box, and does not bite or scratch. This work can take anywhere from two weeks to two months. Homeless cats come in every breed, hair length, and color. Once adopted, friends are shocked at the beginning story of these beautiful creatures! This beautiful cat, Bonfire Marshmellow (female, age 1-2 years), and others are available for adoption. That's why we say, "Adopt Don't Shop!"

These 3 R's Let Your Happy Relationship Bloom

Spring symbolizes rebirth and reminds us of the constant opportunity to refresh and renew our lives and improve our relationships.

And, if couples don't get too caught up in "making" themselves seem happy, they can use the longer spring days to relax and reflect on how to refresh their daily priorities, renew their relationships, and let their "happy" bloom naturally.

The 3 R's of Relationship Improvement

Reflect: Despite what you may think, people don't really learn from experience. Instead, we learn from reflecting on our experiences. And, it's the same for couples.

Think about it. Unless they reflect on their experiences, couples just rehash the same argument and make the same mistakes over and over again. To renew their relationship, couples must truly think about how their life could flow more easily and be filled with the simple pleasures that constitute true happiness, not the manufactured kind. This type of reflection usually begins with one person, who later shares it with the other.

So, this spring try to capture some relaxing time for yourself so that you can truly reflect on your relationship. Does your marriage seem routine? Does your spouse seem like your roommate and not your best friend and the love of your life? Do you fight about things that don't really matter and avoid talking about the things that do? Have you let the kids' activities monopolize all your discretionary time? Have you let your own interests take away from the time you could (and probably should) be spending with your partner? Have you let financial concerns keep you from finding creative ways to bring simple joys into your relationship?

Refresh: In order to let your "happy" bloom naturally again, you first must identify the patterns you would like to improve. So, whatever life stage or circumstance you are in, think honestly about what small changes would make a big difference, and keep in mind that it might be YOUR approach that needs to change.

Once you have identified the

existing patterns that interfere with the easy flow of happiness in your relationships, select the one non-threatening pattern that you believe — if changed — would bring a sense of renewal to the daily life of your relationship. Later, you can address the other issues you identified.

Make one change at a time, because the increased happiness you feel from the first change makes subsequent changes easier to implement.

Begin to change the interfering pattern by refreshing the way you and your spouse/partner approach the issue involved. This will, of course, require you to disclose what you've been thinking about to your partner. The trick is to initiate the conversation with what's called a "soft start-up". A "soft startup" addresses the issue directly and head-on but does NOT include criticism or blame. Begin with an "I" statement and say, for example, "Things are so hectic for us these days, I really miss having time to just hang out with you. Will you help me figure out some small changes we could make in our routines so that there is more time for us to just be together?"

This refreshed approach will not work if your partner feels blamed for your discontent. Be sure to use the soft start-up and



take the time needed to create a safe conversational zone. Then, don't be surprised if you learn that your partner has been feeling the same way.

Renew: When couples refresh their approach to managing the daily patterns in their lives, they are able to reprioritize the allocation of their time, energy, and finances; recapture time to invest in their relationship; and create a sense of renewal and base-line happiness in their relationships. When this happens, couples don't even think about how to make happiness, it just blooms naturally, like spring, every day.

So, share this column with your partner, grab some cou-

ple time, and brush up on the 3 R's that let happy relationships bloom naturally.

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

A few years ago, I attended my first Catholic mass in a busy church outside Birmingham. It was Easter Sunday. I sat in the nosebleed section.

People greeted me with the words, "He's risen."

And because I was not raised under a rock, I answered with: "He's risen indeed."

I was not reared Catholic. I was born into a fundamentalist family with a mother who sometimes prayed in tongues over our meatloaf.

But after my father died, I learned that he had been raised Catholic. He went to Catholic school, he played Catholic baseball.

He didn't talk about it. I never knew that version of him. All I knew was a man who did not dance at wedding receptions for fear the pastor would catch him.

There in the Catholic cathedral, the priest announced, "He is risen."

"He's risen indeed," said the congregation.

I was an outsider in the room. The priest recited the Liturgy of the Eucharist, people formed a single-file line to drink out of a chalice.

Easter Sundays in my family were nothing like this. My father was an usher at our little church. He'd stand by the front door and hand out bulletins that advertised upcoming Baptist church events.


For example:

—Thursday fundraiser, dinner on the grounds. Bring a covered dish.

—Young men's Bible study, 6 P.M. Bring a covered dish.

---Women's Sunday school class is holding an upcoming prayer vigil against beer. Bring a congealed salad.

—Men's group is recruiting for its annual mission trip to Biloxi.



And any Baptist worth his salt would answer with, "He's risen indeed."

Most who attended our church on Easter were only visitors. They came twice per year. My father called them "nosebleed Baptists."

I never heard anyone else use that term. I asked my father what this meant.

"Well," he said. "Some fans only come to games once a year and sit in the nosebleed section. And other fans never miss a ballgame, even when the pitcher stinks."

"Which ones are we?" I asked.

"You've heard our new preacher, you tell me."

Our preacher delivered fiery sermons. He would remove his jacket and preach to heartless sinners, drunks, and those who danced at wedding receptions.

The church services of my youth were lengthy. Someone in the congregation would either faint from low blood sugar, or be suddenly overcome with the spirit of narcolepsy.

But this Catholic business was different. Mass was foreign to me. It was exoctic, and beautiful.

All my life, my father refused to step foot in a Catholic church. And he wouldn't even talk about it.

But then, there was that one time.



On the way home from a Boy Scout meeting, he pulled into a Catholic church. I knew my father was having a rough time at work. I'd overheard him talking with my mother through the hot-air vents.

"The boss is killing me," my father once said. "I can't sleep, can't eat..."

At night, sometimes I found my father vomiting in the bathroom from stress. I would ask what was wrong, he would tell me to go back to bed.

That afternoon, Daddy wheeled into a Catholic church and turned off the truck. There was a man cutting the church lawn with a push mower, he wore a white collar.

My father told me to wait in the vehicle.

Daddy was in that chapel for almost two hours. When he came back his face was wet and his eyes were pink. I never asked why. And he never told me.

Anyway, Easter mass was lovely. I'll never forget it. The priest told the people that "Easter is when dead things come back to life, when we remember how the finger of God can touch dead wood and make it green again."

I had to write that down I liked it so much.

After the service, I stayed in the chapel until all people had left. The priest sat in a pew behind me. He introduced himself. "Father," I said, "I'm not

Catholic, but I really enjoyed mass."

"Yeah?" he said. "Thanks for celebrating the Resurrection with us."

"Can I ask you a question, Father?"

"Shoot."

"Have you ever lost anyone?" "Yes. I lost my mom, my dad, and my brother."

"Do you think about them a lot?"

He ducked his head. He let out a sigh. "Every second. Actually, I was thinking about Mom this morning. You know, when I was growing up, she would always laugh about the big Easter crowds and call them 'nosebleed Catholics.' Isn't that funny?"

It sure is.

On my way out of church, the priest and I took a slow walk down the aisle. I admired the statuary, and the beautiful stained-glass windows.

The priest hugged me, then said, "He is risen."

And well, you know the rest. Happy Easter.



Financial Research and Commentary March 25, 2022 Will Money Become Scarce Again?

It seems that these days everywhere you go there is a shortage of service, a shortage of product or a shortage of labor, or people to help you. Americans have never been in stronger financial shape, savings have never been higher, and it seems like jobs have never been so plentiful. The jobless claims number just reported this week shows the lowest number of claims since 1969 (of course the labor market and population are much larger now). Americans are flush with cash more than ever before. And that has shown up in housing prices, stock prices (in 2020 and 2021) and other asset prices except perhaps for investment grade bonds.

Inflation is a much bigger consideration in investing today than it has been in past decades.

The Federal Reserve and the federal government applied massive stimulus and relief going back almost two years ago as America and the world plunged into the pandemic. Almost 25 million jobs suddenly went away. Restaurants and businesses across the land had to close until further notice. That massive stimulus came in two forms: 1) new spending bills passed and signed by the President and 2) the lowering of interest rates and the buying of Treasuries and mortgage backed (and other) bonds by the Federal Reserve. The latter unleashed almost \$5 trillion dollars of new money into the financial system. That more than doubled what the Fed had done in history to date. And the Fed "printed" about 30% of all money created in the US for over the past 200 years in that short two-year time. That eventually (adding to the supply chain problems) unleashed monetary inflation: Too many dollars chasing suddenly fewer goods and services. When considering an investment, we encourage individuals to look at the real rate of return (after inflation) as they make their evaluation.

The Fed is acting.

Now the Fed is, very carefully, moving to address inflation and has raised its shortest-term rate, known as the Federal Funds rate from 0% to .25%. That is also known as the overnight rate. Banks are an immediate benefactor of this because any funds they park overnight with the Fed start receiving this, vs zero or close to zero. Investors are also seeing an immediate benefit as the yields on money market funds have also increased. We therefore continue to be encouraged by long term opportunities in the banking industry, which is part of the Financial sector of the S&P 500. We think that clients should consider the top 40 largest banks (measured in terms of total deposits) in particular.

The Fed's balance sheet

The greater impact, we believe, on inflation, and asset prices of all kinds, will be when the Fed begins to reduce the size of its approximately \$9 trillion balance sheet. We feel that has much more impact as it makes money scarcer. The Fed is being, in our opinion, very practical and tactical as it tries to slow the rate of inflation without harming this very strong economy. With the Fed not competing to buy Treasuries and mortgage-backed securities, that could mean less price support and yields could continue to rise. Not good for bond prices but could help slow the rate of inflation. The Fed has indicated that action on the balance sheet could come by May or by summer.

The question becomes, will those two major components increase by the same amount in 2022? We don't think so. We think money will slowly become scarcer and that will mean a lowering of prices for just about everything. We do believe inflation will range from 3-5% by year's end.

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Share the Road: Bicycle and Motorcycle Safety

As the weather warms up, more people will be on the roads riding bicycles and motorcycles. While there are many laws operators must adhere to, there are also laws for other motorists to observe when operating near and around these vehicles. The end of April and beginning of May brings additional motorcycle traffic to our area as the Thunder Beach Motorcycle Rally takes place. It is important for all motorists to be aware of the traffic laws as well as put into practice some tips to keep both cyclists and motorists operating safely together on the roadways.

Sharing the Road with Bicycles

· Florida law requires motorists to give bicyclists a minimum of three feet of clearance and use caution/slow speed when driving alongside or passing them.

• On a two-lane road, motorists should pass a bicyclist as one would a slow-moving vehicle, and only when it is safe to do so.

• When crossing a bike lane to make a turn, yield to any bicyclist in the bike lane and make your turn behind the cyclist.

• Do not follow a bicyclist too closely.

• At night, avoid using high beam headlights when you see a bicyclist approaching.

• Bicyclists may ride out of the bike lane into the travel lane for their own safety due to narrow roads, to avoid obstacles or pavement hazards, or to prepare for a left turn.

• Bicyclists must obey all traffic controls and signals.

· Bicyclists must not wear headphones or ear-buds while bicycling on the roadway.

Sharing the Road with Motorcycles

• You must never attempt to share the lane with a motorcycle. The motorcyclist is entitled to the entire lane.

• Do not follow too closely to a motorcycle; motorcycles have the ability to stop more quickly than other vehicles.

• Watch for motorcycles and look carefully before pulling into an intersection or changing lanes.

• It is difficult to gauge the speed of a motorcycle; they may appear to be much farther away than they really are.

• Motorcyclists often slow down by down-shifting or rolling off the throttle, thus not activating the brake light.

• Never pass a motorcyclist with only a few feet of space. The force of the wind can cause a rider to lose control.

Motorcycle Endorsements

Florida law requires anyone desiring to operate a two or three-wheel motorcycle, whose engine size is more than 50 cc, to obtain a motorcycle endorsement on their driver license or hold a 'Motorcycle Only' license.

To obtain the motorcycle endorsement, motorcyclists must:

• You must hold at least a valid Class E operator's driver license.

• Complete the Basic Rider-Course® (BRC) or Basic Rider-Course updated® (BRCu) motorcycle safety course with an authorized Sponsor.

After successfully passing the RiderCourse®, you must obtain your endorsement within (1) year. If the endorsement has not been obtained during the oneyear grace period, the course completion card as well as the "Pass" waiver status is considered invalid and you must complete another RiderCourse® before the endorsement can be

After you complete the Basic RiderCourse® (BRC) or

Basic RiderCourse updated® (BRCu), visit a driver license office or tax collector office that issues driver licenses and inform them that you completed the course. Upon providing proper ID and paying the required endorsement fees, your Class E license will be issued with a motorcycle endorsement.



5) Wear protective clothing: gloves, eyeglasses, rubber boots and a face mask.


6) Open windows to allow fresh air in and ventilate well to remove any fumes.

7) Add small amounts of chlorine bleach to standing water to ensure some disinfection.


8) Use sump pumps to remove excessive water.

We live in a networking society. As a business owner, marketing manager or business development strategist, networking is crucial to generating and developing relationships. Here are a few Networking 101 basics to remember the next time you attend a business luncheon, cocktail party, or chamber of com-

merce social.

First, Remember to radi-

ate optimism and realize that positive body language draws people in. When conversing with someone, become cognizant of your gestures, expressions, and tone of voice. How you say something can be more important than what you say. Did you know that on average, people absorb you 55% by visual – how you appear; 38% by tone - how you sound; and only 7% by content - what you say. (This is conservative; I've also heard the ratio 80% visual, 15% tonal, and 5% content). Forms of positive body language that draw people in include an enthusiastic tone, strong posture (uncrossing your arms with open shoulders), leaning toward the other person, a firm handshake, maintaining eye contact, and a smile.


Community: Next-Level Networking

OK, so you're getting ready to go to the event. Arm yourself with props... your name badge and business cards to give out. Make it a game to obtain three business cards. My "Rule of Seven" instructs you to acquire three business cards from three brand new people, further three conversations with people you already know (but not necessarily well), and introduce two people you know (or just met) to each other. Have you 30-second elevator pitch ready: who you are, what you do, and why you are passionate about it.

I love the book Seven Habits of Highly Effective People by Dr. Stephen Covey because his seven habits are a beautiful roadmap to networking more effectively. His first habit is Be proactive. Take the first step...you make a point of crossing that crowded room to get to that person standing there all alone...or even that person who has a small line of people waiting to meet them. Second, Begin with the end in mind. What are you trying to achieve with this meeting? Are you establishing a possible business lead? Making a new friend? Perhaps this person has associates in THEIR sphere who are your target market? Why is it important to meet this person? Third, Put first things first. Establish a connection with eye contact, a warm smile, and a handshake. Details of your company, title, and business can come later... this is the time to establish a human connection. Research shows that most people decide whether or not they like you within the first seven seconds of meeting you, then they spend the rest of the conversation internally justifying their initial reaction.

Fourth, Think win/win. It's not all about what you will gain; think about what will THEY gain in meeting or talking to you? What can you do for them? Often, a solid business relationship begins with being the first with the generous offer. Fifth, Seek first to understand, then to be understood. Listen! Repeat the person's name, and then repeat it again at the end. You can learn more from listening than speaking. A good rule of thumb is to speak 20% and listen 80%. Dan Rather, our national voice of reason, said, "The best leaders are excellent listeners. Look people in the eye when they are talking to you." Sixth, Synergize. Tony Robbins had a name for a style of active engagement: "Mirroring and Mimicking." This refers to completely getting on the same page as the person you're communicating with... imitating their posture and body language, using the same volume, cadence and pitch as theirs, echoing their vocabulary style, word choices, and accent. What happens is the other person subliminally feels comfortable and at ease with you because you are "on the same page."

And finally, Sharpen the saw. Once a rapport is established, ask the more meaningful questions. Inquire about the details. If you have time for a more profound conversation, go deeper, and ask some more creative questions (this may be better for a lunch outing) such as What's your story? What do you love about what you do (most people like to answer this question)? What challenges have you overcome? What is your greatest triumph?





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
