Tourist Wave Ignores Inflation, Gas Prices

Despite inflation fears, near-record gasoline prices and lingering Covid-19 concerns, Panama City Beach is entering the summer tourism season with near-record attendance, officials say.

While detailed statistics for the Memorial Day weekend were not yet in as of June 3, preliminary figures compiled by consultants monitoring visitation confirmed that Panama City Beach is continuing to attract near-record attendance thus far this year, said Dan Rowe, President of the Bay County Tourist Development Council.

"Even with gas prices and inflation at their current levels, Panama City Beach remains a destination of choice," Rowe said. "Based on the data we received from our research partners, Panama City Beach was on par with last year in terms of occupancy and revenues."

The positive tourism trend has been obvious to city residents and visitors alike. During the four-day Memorial Day weekend, the crowded beachfront, packed resort parking lots and bumper-to-bumper traffic on city roadways gave visual affirmation that people are opting for a vacation experience here despite the troublesome economic trends. The scene was duplicated on June 2 as the first of tens of thousands of visitors began gathering at Frank Brown Park for the four-day 2022 Pepsi Gulf Coast Jam country music festival.

Furthermore, the latest tourism bed tax collection figures presented to the TDC at its May 24 meeting show that attendance has been strong since the beginning of the 2022 season. The county collects 5 cents on each dollar of tourism lodging receipts, giving a numerical indicator of attendance trends.

In the six-month period ending March 31, bed tax collections on Panama City Beach totaled \$9.19 million, a 33-percent increase from \$7.4 million during the same period in 2020-21, and just slightly below the \$9.8 million collected during 2018-19, the last reporting period prior to the outbreak of the



Covid-19 pandemic.

However, another figure from the March 2020 report gives evidence that even with the ongoing spike in inflation, the current tourism season will at minimum tie last year's performance. Gross receipt figures for the month of March alone in the fiscal years 2021 and 2022 show that this year the city collected \$53.98 million, a 6.3-percent hike over \$50.7 million gathered during last year's breakout tourism season.

"Our foundation is strong," Rowe said. "Barring a storm, there are no threats to prevent Panama City Beach's continued success."

Tourism officials around the state described a similar situation where Americans are opting for a Florida vacation experience – gas pump prices and inflation be damned.

Visit Florida, the state tourism marketing agency, reported last month that that 35.9 million people traveled to the state between the start of January and the end of March, a 39.6-percent hike over the first quarter of 2021 when Covid-19 vaccines were becoming more widely available and spiking the first sign of economic recovery. More important for tourism officials, the new total was up 1.35 percent from the first quarter of 2019, before the pandemic started.

Florida has now recorded four consecutive quarters attracting more than 30 million visitors, the agency said. Tourism statewide has also posted three consecutive quarters with numbers topping the same periods in 2019, when the state handled a record 131 million tourists



On April 12, at "The Rock & Roll Church" - the nickname of Faith Assembly Church in Miramar Beach, First Responder Tina Wilken was awarded a new air conditioning system. "I've been a full-time deputy sheriff for a year and a half," she stated. "I'm a single mom of five children, and needless to say, I have a full house!" Tina's current system was between 11 and 12 years old, and she'd spent around \$2,000 to keep it running in only a year-and-a-half. "I love what I do, but I have to budget my spending to provide for my family," she continued. "This means choosing the most appropriate places to direct my finances. The choice of either purchasing a brand-new HVAC unit - or having my home insured – was not much of an option for me." Tina attended the lunch and was present to accept her award, stating what a blessing it is for her family.



One week later, on April 19, another Appreciation Lunch was held in Bay County at Texas Roadhouse. Kevin Fordred, a U.S. Army Combat Medic Vet who currently works as an EMT, is a newlywed and his wife works in oncology. They just purchased their first home together in Panama City, and with the currently inflated housing market there were limited homes to choose from in their budget. They landed on a two-bed, two-bath fixer-upper built in the fifties. Little did they know that multiple large projects would have to be completed, such as needing a new HVAC unit along with to accept his award.

Local Veteran Jay Mabry is a four-year honorably discharged U.S. Navy veteran. He lived and worked aboard the USS Seattle during his enlistment. Originally from Galveston Island, Texas, Jay has lived in Bay County for the last 19 years and works at Edgewater Beach Resort. "Because of the price of rent and long-term leases, my wife and I bought a home in the Cove area this past May," he explained. "We love the home and the quiet of the area." Unfortunately, Jay was recently told he'd need to begin radiation treatments at the Cancer Research Center, M-F for the next nine weeks. "The AC unit in my home is an older system that I know needs some work. Between missing my work hours and the cancer treatments, there's no way I'm going to be able to afford to replace the AC system anytime in the near future." Jay was present at the lunch to accept his award and acknowledged what an amazing thing it was.

If you had asked me ten years ago what my favorite tree was, I don't think I could have come up with just one selection. My yard in Georgia contained Japanese Maples, magnolia, arborvitae, crape myrtle, pines, and oaks and I thought they were all fantastic (and still do). However, after living in Northwest Florida during the last decade and watching how trees perform in sandy soil through droughts,

floods, and a devastating hurricane, one tree has won my heart as the favorite: Baldcypress Taxodium distichum.

This stately delicate leafed conifer grows quickly but has strong wood that is resistant to breakage and holds up in high winds. It is native to North America with a range covering the Southeast from Texas up to Illinois and Indiana, down to Florida then up the Atlantic Coast all the way to Delaware. The natural environment for this tree is along stream banks and wetlands making it very tolerant of flooding, but also able to withstand drought once established. Baldcypress thrives in sun, shade, sand, clay, acidic, or slightly alkaline soils making it incredibly versatile. It even has moderate salt tolerance so it can be used in areas that may get salt spray on occasion. The mature size is 100-150 feet tall by 40-50 feet wide in the wild, but in landscapes a more moderate 60-80 feet by 25-35 feet is more typical.

Baldcypress grows upright with a straight central leader which creates a very symmetrical canopy without pruning or training when grown in full sun. The light green leaves turn copper in the fall then drop off in the winter but are so fine textured they really do not require raking. The trunk is reddish brown with linear striations giving visual texture in the winter. Since baldcypress is a conifer, it forms cones as the fruit which is attractive to birds. A few insects rely on baldcypress for food and habitat, but damage is minimal and does not require any action – this is a very low maintenance tree!

One distinctive feature of baldcypress that gets a bad reputation is one of my favorites, the formation of knees. Knees are woody projections that rise vertically out of the ground from baldcypress roots. The function of knees is not known, but there are many theories. It is recognized that they tend to be more prevalent when the tree is grown in areas that alternate between dry soil and flooding or trees that grow in shallow water. The most common complaint I hear is that it is difficult to mow under a baldcypress because of the knees, but growing turfgrass in the shade of a tree canopy is not recommended so a simple solution is to just mulch the bed and minimize mowing!

If you are looking for a reliable, low maintenance shade tree for your landscape consider baldcypress. This is a beautiful native tree that will take care of itself once established and thrives in some of our toughest landscape situations.

Where the Magic Happens:

Andy Gross Comes to Harpoon Harry's

There's a new act in town, and it's well, magic. Literally. And funny. Also literally. Andy Gross, a magician slash comedian slash ventriloquist is Harpoon Harry's "magician in residence" this summer, and he's here to mess with your mind (in all the right ways), make you laugh, and possibly even make you forget your sunburn (though no guarantees). Harpoon Harry's is just the right sized venue to get up close and personal with

Gross's performance too, from his more traditional tricks (aided by local magician's assistant, Emma Corbell), to fresh takes on ventriloquism, with engaging slight-of-hand acts and plenty of audience interaction to keep things moving.

Gross got his start at the tender age of nine after watching the movie, "Magic." Forget creepy clowns - here the plot centers around a ventriloquist and his creepy dummy. Gross was sold. "When I saw that I

was asking my parents, 'How did they do that, how did they do that?" His parents sent him to the library to find out, and when a ventriloquist came to his hometown of St. Louis, Missouri, his mom tracked him down and got the young Andy signed up for a mail order course on voice throwing. Gross would record himself throwing his voice, and send the tapes back for critique. "T'd wait by the mailbox for that tape to come back," he says with a laugh. With some saved birth-




day money, he bought his first professional dummy for \$142, one with eyes and eyebrows that moved. "I took it with me everywhere." From ventriloquism, it was an easy jump to magic. "After that I had a friend about my age who did some card tricks, and he showed me a couple of card tricks, and I was hooked," remembers Gross. As the self-described class-clown, the comedic component of his performance came naturally.

However, it wasn't straight out on stage for Gross, but rather to the racquetball courts. By the time he hit 15, he was professional racquetball's youngest player. His savvy on the courts earned him numerous tournament wins and other accolades until at 26, he hung up his racquet and took his other show on the road. Since then, he's made appearances on assorted to shows and been a guest on "The

Ellen Show," gone viral with his "Split Man" videos, and made thousands laugh with countless stage performances from coast to coast. These days, an often grueling travel schedule doesn't faze Gross. "I'm kind of a road warrior, I absolutely love it," he explains. However, with four children (all of whom are also in one form of show business or another), it can be a challenge to get everyone in the same place at the same time. Which is why when Harpoon Harry's, a well-known PCB beach-side hot-spot, invited him to come for the summer (after he took the stage several nights back in November, 2021), he jumped on it. "I thought it would be great that the kids can come here and have a place for the summer," says Gross.

Summer is Here and So is Red Snapper Season!

Red Snapper season officially opened June 1 for the Federally Permitted Charter and Headboats and we are all looking forward to taking you on a fun family experience in the Gulf of Mexico. Treasure Island, Pirates Cove, Lighthouse Marina and, of course, Capt. Anderson's Marina all offer great fishing experiences.

On the shorter headboat trips, many families are teaching their children to fish - no IT gadgets here! Deckhands provide bait, show you how to use it, give you a quick lesson on deepsea fishing, and then it's all up to you. You drop your line straight down to the bottom, take a couple of turns on the reel to get the slack out of the line and you are set. Smaller fish nibble at your bait, and thus steal it, so be sure to check your bait every now and then. When you get a bite, set the hook (pull up hard on your rod) then reel up quickly. If you don't, you may lose the fish or it will run into the reef below and cut your line. While reeling, let your deckhand know you have a fish on so he will be ready to assist. He will take the fish off your line and put it on a stringer with your 'fishing spot' number on it. (Your spot number is on your fishing ticket. You will need that later to claim your fish at the dock.) In the meantime, all the fish caught are kept in a common ice box until the end of the trip.

On the longer trips, the more serious anglers are able to get out into deeper water. Although on both trips you have opportunities to catch fish, the longer the trip the more fishing time, of course. Also, as the saying goes, the deeper the water, the bigger the fish - not always true, but typically it is. The same fishing techniques apply in the deeper water.

Each trip has captains who have decades of experience; they will get you to the fish. The fish may not be hungry, but thankfully, they usually are.

Other tips you may consider: since fish don't care for sunscreen or perfume, be sure to wash your hands of these things before handling your bait. Oth-



erwise, wearing sunscreen is a very good idea, and we do not want to discourage you from protecting yourself from the sun.

Each trip has its perks... Early mornings right after sunrise all is quiet on the Gulf except the occasional seagull asking

for your Cheetos - yes they love them! Be careful though, what goes in, comes out.

The later morning and midday trips give you a chance to ease into your day. No matter the time, you can usually see dolphins playing, an occasional turtle easing by, or a flying fish - yes they skim the top of the water for long distances.

The evening trip is special in that you can catch the sunset as you travel to the fishing grounds each night. It's always a favorite for that reason and that it is cooler in the evening.

Red Snapper is not the only fish in the sea worth keeping, even though it is probably the most popular in our area. Gag Grouper season opens June 1, also; Red Grouper will remain open. And, even though it may not be as famous a fish, Vermilion snapper is available yearround and is a delicious mainstay of the local fishery.

Summer dates are booking quickly at the beautiful Event Center overlooking beautiful Grand Lagoon. Be sure to check out our new J's Brewhouse with breakfast, sandwiches and drinks, Souvenir Shop and The Sugar Shack with Dippin' Dots, dockside at the marina.

For one, try a local farmers market. There are over ten in the Orlando area, and they aren't just on weekends (they even have a Monday market, the Audubon Park Community Market). Popular weekly markets include the Maitland Farm-

ers Market (produce, crafts, and live music) every Sunday, 9 a.m.-1:30 p.m., the TPD Night Market, every Thursday and Friday from 6-10 p.m., and the Orlando Farmers Market at Lake Eola Park (downtown Orlando) every Sunday from 9 a.m. - 1:30 p.m. Along with the weekly farmers markets, there are also bigger markets that happen every few months such as the quarterly Milk Mart (with over 125 local vendors) and the Sanford Indie Market. Seek out local vendors selling vintage clothing from a remolded bus (Canyon Couture), seasonal candles (Many Mumbling Mice), and coffee (Totally Coffee), as well as jewelry (Tinker and Dabble), pet-friendly goods, and of course, seasonal produce.

Another great place about five minutes north of Orlando is Winter Park, the place where people go to retire (or so you thought). Downtown Winter Park is filled with lots of shops, restaurants, and sights. In fact Mister Rogers wrote "It's a Beautiful Day in the Neighborhood," about Winter Park, and there's even a walking tour associated with notable Mister Rogers' locations. Cultural types won't want to miss the Charles Hosmer More Museum of American Art with the world's largest collection of glass works by Louis Comfort Tiffany, or the Rollins Museum of Art, a college museum accredited by the American Alliance of Museums. For a mix of art and tranquil outdoor scenery, leave time for a detour through the museum, home, and gardens of

Czech sculptor, Albin Polasek, situated on the banks of Lake Osceola. Round out your excursion with a stroll through downtown Winter Park, and stop for lunch at a spot like Briarpatch.

Looking for something outdoorsy? Try Kelly Park Rock Springs, a popular hangout for locals - so popular in fact that often before the park officially opens at 8 a.m. it's at capacity with many holding a ticket hoping to be able to come back in the afternoon. In fact, you might try to get there at about 6:30 a.m. on weekends just to snag a place. The park offers tubes you can buy or you can bring your own tube (under 5 feet). As well as being a great place to swim, the park has many deer, birds, turtles, fish, and the occasional

If waking up at the crack of dawn to maybe get a spot at Kelly Park isn't your thing, try Wekivia springs instead. Wekiva Springs isn't just a swimming spring- it's also a place where you can rent a kayak or canoe and ride the run. At the end of the spring there's a great spot to jump in and swim. The park usually gets to capacity on a busy day by around 9:00 a.m., however on a slower day there is a chance you can get there at 1:00 p.m. and still get in.

Clearly, Orlando isn't just about meet and greets with Mickey or thrills and spills on the biggest coasters - so next time you're down in central Florida, consider setting aside a day to discover some of Orlando's lesser-known local treasures

Skeeter-Free Home Sweet Home

Spring has sprung, summer is around the corner, and we all will be spending more quality time enjoying northwest Florida's great outdoors. Enjoying picnics, sporting events to evening outdoor concerts but... are you prepared for the crescendo of Mother Nature's symphony and its annoying buzzing section?

You might ask, what can one do to abate this annoying occurring situation? It all starts at home. Before heading outdoors make certain to put on insect repellent recommended by the Centers for Disease Control (CDC) as your protective invisible shield. Remember to always read the label first and to re-apply the repellent just like a sunscreen. The lower the percentage of the active ingredient the more often you will need to re-apply the repellent. Fact: Only the female mosquito bites, not the male. She needs a blood meal to develop her eggs. One

drop of blood can produce 250 to 300 eggs!

To keep a home or business property mosquito-free, become familiar with the surrounding outdoor environment. It is recommended to take a weekly tour of your property and look for any source that might be holding unwanted standing water. Even if it has not rained for a while, irrigation systems still can fill items with unwanted water. Examples are bird baths, buckets, boats, canoes, coolers, empty paint cans, kayaks, pools, rain gutters, spas, soda cans, tarps, tires, tire swings, trash cans, wading pools, wheelbarrows, or any other type of container. When you find item(s) with standing water, please dump the water and remove the source to rid the area of future mosquito breeding site(s). This will also eliminate any mosquito larvae or pupae that may already be present. Mosquitoes spend three life stages (egg, larva, and pupa) of their four-part life cycle in water. As hot humid temperatures continue to rise into summer along with typical intermittent rain showers, this will cause an increase of rapid mosquito growth. The outcome is a substantial rise in mosquito populations which can cause mosquito borne diseases transmission.






The truth is we never know the impact we're having on stu-

Review: Señor Frog's

It was Saturday night and Señor Frog's was alive! The loud eighties rock (which would continue for the duration of our visit) welcomed us, and the place was vibrant with activity. Jen, the manager, greeted us and took us to our outside table overlooking the Gulf while a beautiful fresh sea breeze passed through. The DJ was playing "Name That Tune," our server Bennett brought waters, and Executive Chef Paco came out to meet us. Señor Frog's, he shared, began in Cancun, Mexico, with eight other establishments throughout resort towns in Mexico, four establishments in the US: in Orlando, Las Vegas, Myrtle Beach, and now, as of April, Panama City Beach, one in Puerto Rico, and two in the Bahamas.

The Congo Line was getting rowdy, and the natives were getting restless... time to order a cocktail! I ordered a Cadillac Margarita – cool, tart, and refreshing with fresh citrus fruit afloat, and Bennett brought us bowls of guacamole, salsa, and queso with homemade corn tor-



tilla chips. The guacamole was delicious, and I could taste the fresh garlic, lime, tomatoes, and cilantro. Same with the chunky salsa, and the queso was warm and creamy with diced tomatoes, peppers, and onions. Now, you're going to hear me say two words repeatedly throughout this Restaurant Review, Fresh and Homemade, because — well — everything on the menu is. Everything is also colorful, beautifully presented, and tastes scrumptious!

It felt like we were on a

cruise ship as the glorious sun set behind the Gulf's horizon. A Señor Frog's Experience is all about having FUN... letting loose a little and having a memorable time. Kool & the Gang was belting out "Celebration," and I'm pretty sure at that point every guest was as well. Chef Paco brought out the stunning Shrimp Ceviche Trio with corn tortilla chips and plantains... a culinary work of art. The House Ceviche mixes red onion, tomato, and fresh cilantro alongside fresh whole Gulf shrimp; the




Tropical Ceviche added diced sweet mango, and the Aguachile Ceviche intermingled jalapenos, diced cucumbers, and cilantro. Every so often manager Frank would stop by to check on us. We felt well taken care of, and the service was excellent (kudos to Marco, GM, for hiring such a great staff!). Another appetizer soon arrived, the magnificent Wings Platter. Four kinds of wings - BBQ, Honey Mustard, Buffalo, and Mango Habanero - took their own quadrant on the platter separated by wedges of cheese quesadillas and a central mountain of shredded cabbage, diced mango, and fresh cilantro. But wait - there's more! Chef Paco arrived again with a

glorious Taco Platter consisting of five types of tacos in soft tortillas: Pulled Chicken, Carnitas, Grilled Shrimp, and Carne Asada (all with corn tortillas), and Blackened Mahi. The latter I found to be absolutely mouthwatering - the tender mahi tossed with cilantro lime slaw, chipotle aioli, and grilled street corn relish wrapped in a warm flour tortilla. All tacos were served with a rich and spicy Morita sauce - a marriage of jalapeno and smoked chipotle. (I fell in love with this condiment and found that it goes well on ALL FIVE tacos, especially the Carne Asada.)

At this point the DJ, sitting up in the Crow's Nest above the big screen, proclaimed, "Here at Señor Frog's we like to have fun, party, and dance!" The drum choir whistles started blowing, the music got louder, and the guests started dancing. We were full and very satisfied. But Bennett told us it wasn't time to leave yet... and Chef Paco again appeared, this time with a trio of desserts. He told us the tall dish was a traditional Mexican dessert called Strawberries & Cream with a rich, sweet blend of sour cream and sweetened condensed milk at the bottom, folded into the fresh strawberry chunks, and fluffy whipped cream atop. The Homemade Key Lime Pie sat on a thick bed of sweet graham cracker crust topped with a dual drizzle of mango and banana sauces. And the Cinnamon Churros were coated in crunchy cinnamon-sugar and served with small bowls of Mexican chocolate sauce and thick, rich caramel sauce for dipping. Delectable!

It's nice to see that the new Señor Frog's has maintained some of the best parts of Hang Five – the former establishment in this location – like including a few of Hang Five's favorite dishes such as the Fried Pickles, Pretzel Bites, Seafood Gumbo, the Beach Burger, Mardi Gras Pasta, and Pan Seared Grouper on their menu.

"Proud to Be an American"

"America the Beautiful"-Ray Charles

Considered one of the great-

est moments in history for patriotic music, Ray Charles took to the stage at the World Series in October 2001 to sing "America the Beautiful." Just weeks after the tragedy of 9/11, his performance left the sold-out stadium of grieving Americans inspired to unite and rebuild after tragedy. The song is based on a poem by college professor Katharine Lee Bates, written in 1893 after she visited the summit of Pikes Peak in Colorado one of the tallest mountains in the United States. In 1976, Ray Charles' "America the Beautiful" was chosen as the theme for the nation's 200th anniversary celebration for the Declaration of Independence and has since been used as an anthem for American citizens to unite together as an endlessly loving and resilient force.


"Take Me Home, Country Roads" - John Denver

Released as part of his 1971 album "Poems, Prayers and Promises," Denver's hit country song was a love letter to the stunning landscape and laid-back lifestyle of the rural South. Surprisingly, his co-writers Bill Danoff and Taffy Nivert had never actually been to West Virginia and instead wrote the lyrics about Maryland, later changing the location to better match the rhythm. The song became a hit almost immediately after release, reaching No. 2 on Billboard's U.S. Hot 100 singles chart and remains today a cultural phenomenon, especially amongst West Virginia natives.

"The Stars and Stripes Forever" – John Philip Sou-

This song is often played during Fourth of July fireworks. Except for "The Star-Spangled Banner," no musical composition has done more to arouse the patriotic spirit of America than this most beloved composition. Symbolic of flag-waving, it has been used with considerable effectiveness to generate patriotic feeling ever since its introduction in Philadelphia on May 14, 1807

Protecting More Than Your Skin

Summer is here. You can feel the humidity thicken and watch traffic double. Sunscreen sales increase as we hit the beach, go camping, work in the yard, etc. Many of us look over the myriad choices focusing on SPF numbers rather than ingredients.

The benefits of being outside, besides lifting our spirits, breathing fresh ocean air and feeling the sun on our face, is the manufacturing of Vitamin D, which is essential for myriad cellular functions.

Many of us know the ultra-

violet (UV) radiation is the culprit behind sunburns, which can lead to peeling skin. This radiation causes damage to oxygen-carrying cells as well as our DNA which can lead to genetic mutation. There are two types, UVA and UVB, which is more harmful. Protection is key but we often associate sunscreen with water activities. What about

driving, shopping outdoors and wearing summer clothes which expose more skin? And what about the other seasons? Why is summer the only time we think about protecting our skin?

My sister loves the sun. She has spent many hours lying on the beach getting her tan on. Back in the '70s, the go-to for tanning was baby oil or lotions that aided in "getting your tan on." However, today my sis spends her time at the doctor's office cutting off skin cancer growths, wearing chemo lotions which peel the cancer off the skin (it hurts and burns) and other not so fun therapies. She has as many as three appointments every year. I, on the other hand,



loved the beach but hated lying on it. I was in the water 99 percent of the time, which probably helped to shield me. I didn't wear any lotion and, although I had my share of sunburns, I have been blessed so far with no major residual damage.

This being said, many sunscreens are a combination of chemicals that are harmful to both the human body and marine life. Many contain oxybenzone and octinoxate (These can be labeled under several different names disguising their existence in the product.) These ingredients are contributors to the demise of coral reefs. They also

Unexpected Consequences of Hormone Therapy

Hormone therapy has many benefits and I've written about these for several years now. Hormones can, however, have some unexpected effects and I have seen these effects firsthand in our clinic. I've informed prospective patients for years that hormones are not just for libido and sexual function. Women tend to focus on their lack of libido and men tend to focus on a lack of performance. But, in my view as a physician, these are the least important benefits of hormone therapy for both men and women.

As a physician, I prefer to focus on the ability to prevent disease and improve the health of both body and mind. Hormone therapy can prevent numerous cancers, diseases of the heart, diseases of the brain and so much more. Hormone therapy reduces cholesterol and blood pressure and lowers overall mortality rates. Testosterone reduces stress levels and anxiety. Many of our patients are able to get off their anti-depressants after starting hormone therapy with us. Patients can finally lose weight.

Motivation increases and mood improves tremendously. In fact, it is not unusual for patients to apologize to us about being angry and irritated prior to therapy. They've been bitter and irritable for so long it had become part of who they were and didn't see how it was affect-



ing everyone around them. After getting treated they were finally happy and relaxed again and quickly realized how poorly they were treating everyone around them, including those they love

Then there are the unintended consequences of hormone therapy. On several occasions in our practice, we have seen couples who were once happy but had reached a point where they just couldn't tolerate each other. At the edge of divorce their stories were all nearly identical. Their partner had just changed. They were tired, quick to anger, lost their empathy and just didn't seem to care about anyone. They couldn't find the person they had married anymore. I would hear,"Our marriage is essentially over so I'm finally doing something for me." After the hormones kicked in, mood improved, stress levels came down, and problems got smaller. The major issues causing arguments turned into the minor issues they had always been. Stress and tension reduced and those quick to react and quick to anger emotions faded. I have heard more than once that getting hormones not only improved the patient's life but also saved a marriage at the brink of extinction.

have been found to accumulate in the tissues of many marine wildlife, which can be passed on to their young. You'll need to do

your own research but two safer sunscreens I've found are Ocean Potion 70 and MyChelle Dermaceuticals Protect 50. Natural safe sunscreens are hard to find, so you might want to see where your choice is sold before trekking out to find it.

As a side note: Did you know that the Blue Light, which is transmitted by our electronic devices from computers to televisions, can lead to visible signs of aging for your skin? Research suggests that sunscreen offers some benefits from this type of radiation.

Aside from sunscreen, activewear clothing now has UV protective fabrics. Add shade to your body by wearing a hat, sunglasses, activewear, using an umbrella, etc. Remember to wear a facial cream with sunblock in it to lower exposure from blue light radiation.

Even with the best care, your hearing aids could fall victim to needing maintenance. Whether it's everyday wear and tear or simply a result of an aging aid, ensure you get the most out of your device by watching out for these common hearing device repairs.

Ear Hook

This is one of the simplest repairs you can do to your hearing aids. The ear hook is the part of the hearing aid that loops around your ear to stop it coming out. The hearing aid hook can become damaged through general wear and tear or when it is not stored in its container.

If the hook becomes damaged it needs to be repaired straight away as you won't be able to use the hearing aid until it's mended.

Broken Microphone

If you are experiencing problems with the sound that is coming through your hearing aid, then there could be a problem with the microphone. This is a job for the highly trained hearing healthcare professionals, you won't be able to do this repair yourself.

Another cause of not hearing the sound properly could be caused by your hearing changing once again, possibly getting worse. If you think that may be the case, partner with your hearing health provider.

Worn Earmold

Over time your earmolds can become damaged through general wear and tear. You will know if your earmold is damaged as it will no longer fit comfortably and properly in your ear. The only way this issue can be rectified is through repair.

Problems with sound? It could be a problem with the microphone.

Damaged Battery Compartment

One final issue to mention is problems that can arise with the battery compartment. If you notice problems with the batteries or the battery compartment, then this will need to be repaired or even replaced. You won't be able to do this yourself, you will need to take it back to your hearing healthcare professional to handle this repair.

A Pastor's Ponderings: Sorting Through the Sources

April showers bring May flowers. I know you have heard that before right? But is it true? and why do we say it? I got to digging around a little bit and although different sources say different things, collectively here in the state of Florida, September is the rainiest month and not April. I guess it sounds better than September showers bring October..... I can't even imagine what September showers bring haha.

The statement April showers bring May flowers is actually what I would call a "wives' tale" or an "Old wives' tale" Maybe older wives tell different tales? I would love to hear your responses to that! See if some of these sound familiar to you:

The swing of the wedding ring determines the sex of the baby. Pull out a grey hair and two more will appear in its place. Don't swim for 30 minutes after you eat or else you will get a cramp and drown. Sitting too close to the TV will make you go blind. Spilling salt brings bad luck. It's bad luck for a black cat to cross your path. A rabbit's foot in your pocket will bring you good luck.

Have you ever heard of any of those? Isn't it funny that some people actually believe those things? As of today, I've not been able to find a single thing that the Bible doesn't address. What does the Bible have to say about old wives' tales? I'm glad you asked. 1 Timothy 4:7 says, "Have nothing to do with godless myths and old wives' tales, rather train



The Glory by Herman Wouk

"The Hope" opens in 1948 and culminates with the triumph of the Six Day War in 1967. Layla Salazar, 10. Each morning when her father drove her to school in his pickup, he played "Sweet Child O' Mine" on the radio. Layla knew all the words.


Tess Mata, 10, was saving up a container of her dollar bills for the family's upcoming trip to Disney World.

Living in a Bear Market

Investors have watched the market move its way down for most of this year. Whether invested in stocks, bonds, crypto or otherwise, it seemed that values just continued to slip. Why has this been so? We look at several inputs to help understand the outputs and talk about what investors might expect and do during these times.

The American economy has been on a growth spurt for quite some time. Believe it or not, the government ran a surplus – that is not a misprint – in April. The federal government took in \$308 billion more than it spent. And that is a dramatic change from a deficit of \$226 billion in April of 2021. We read that it is from strong income for businesses and ponder if the prediction that the U.S. is inflating its way out of record debt is starting to take shape.

Inflation in and of itself however has had quite an impact on the markets. Fears of rising prices for just about everything leaves investors worried that it is a matter of time before corporate profits feel the impact and hence have reduced their exposure to many equities. Technology stocks have been the hardest hit. The problem for many technology stocks is that if they are yet to turn a profit or pay little to no dividends, their stock price feels it when inflation and bond yields rise. The big, somewhat profitable tech stocks, however, have tumbled, along with everything else. By one account, just eight stocks, many of them technology stocks, make up a significant amount of the overall decline of the market.

We think investors should consider investing in many of the legacy, large cap technology stocks at this time as they are nearing multi-year lows and are in a relatively oversold state. The same sentiment is seen by many pundits with regard to biotechnology stocks.

Bear markets have historically hit their trough when we experience negative economic circumstances and perhaps high unemployment and low corporate profits. None of these are the case right now. Pessimism regarding the future is, however, pervasive.

Inflation has also caused the Federal Reserve to begin to increase its short-term rate and begin to reduce the size of its balance sheet. The balance sheet is an indicator of Fed activity in expanding or decreasing the money supply. The Fed has been increasing it since the start of the pandemic. That unleashing of money has driven asset prices for real estate, stocks, commodities, crypto, nonfungible tokens and a host of other assets. One reported statistic is housing values, which have risen \$6 trillion in the last two years alone. The problem it has created is that the increase in the money supply has on the one hand spared the economy from a pandemic-driven depression but on the other also has set inflation in motion. The perfect storm of the supply chain imbalance and pent-up demand from Covid, along with scores of early retirements (causing a labor shortage and driving wage inflation) has led to inflation's rapid rise. Left unchecked, inflation can erode purchasing power as well as standards of living.

The housing market accounts for about 20 percent of the U.S. economy and for at least one third of inflation. There is fear that housing may have peaked as pending sales continue downward and the refinance market has all but ceased. That could reverberate throughout the economy, affecting several sectors

The Fed has an inflation target of two percent per year, which many consider healthy. Currently, inflation is more than four times that and that has sent asset prices down and raised the level of discomfort, if not outright concern, for many investors. We suggest investors look at some things to expect (based upon history) in bear markets and use that in their decision



making. Question: Are market downturns and bear markets the exception or are they the rule? We think that for long-term investing, they are the rule.

Some characteristics of bear markets are important to take note of. The first of these are some of the dramatic upward swings that occur during bear markets. Investors have seen some dramatic legs up in a short period of time, often lasting just a day. Those investors who headed to the sidelines and are waiting to time a movement back into the markets most often miss these and that can have a dramatic impact on long term results. Bear markets also might signal that stocks or other assets had become overbought and an event or a series of events could bring markets back in line with historical averages. If markets are in decline one-third of the time, it could almost be argued that they bring efficiency to the markets by way of asset prices.

Bear markets, when they end – and they average nine months - typically represent very undervalued assets at the end as the pendulum has swung too far in the other direction. Bear markets exhibit excessive pessimism, while bull markets have exhibited excessive optimism. The problem is, they don't ring a bell at the bottom just as they don't ring a bell at the top of markets. We suggest investors, unless they need liquidity (cash) now, stay invested, not give up hope at the worst possible time, remain focused on their goals and govern their actions accordingly.






